Institut œcuménique de Bossey : somme cible 2023

Commentaire

Fondé en 1946, l'Institut œcuménique de Bossey (Bossey) est le centre de formation œcuménique et de formation continue du Conseil œcuménique des Églises (COE) ainsi qu'un centre international de rencontre et de dialogue. Il propose des formations universitaires postgrades et de doctorat et des cours de formation continue pour des théologiens et théologiennes ainsi que des laïcs et des laïques. Les diplômes suivants peuvent y être obtenus : *Complementary Certificate in Ecumenical Studies ; Master of Advanced Studies in Ecumenical Studies ; Doctorate in Theology (Mention Ecumenical Studies)* ainsi que le *Certificate of Advanced Studies in Ecumenical Studies*. Bossey est également fréquenté par des pasteurs et des pasteurs en congé sabbatique. La vie sociale et spirituelle communautaire occupe une place importante dans l'enseignement et la formation œcuménique dispensés à Bossey. Un cours d'été interreligieux est tenu avec succès depuis 2011 pour des étudiantes et des étudiants provenant de contextes chrétien, juif et musulman.

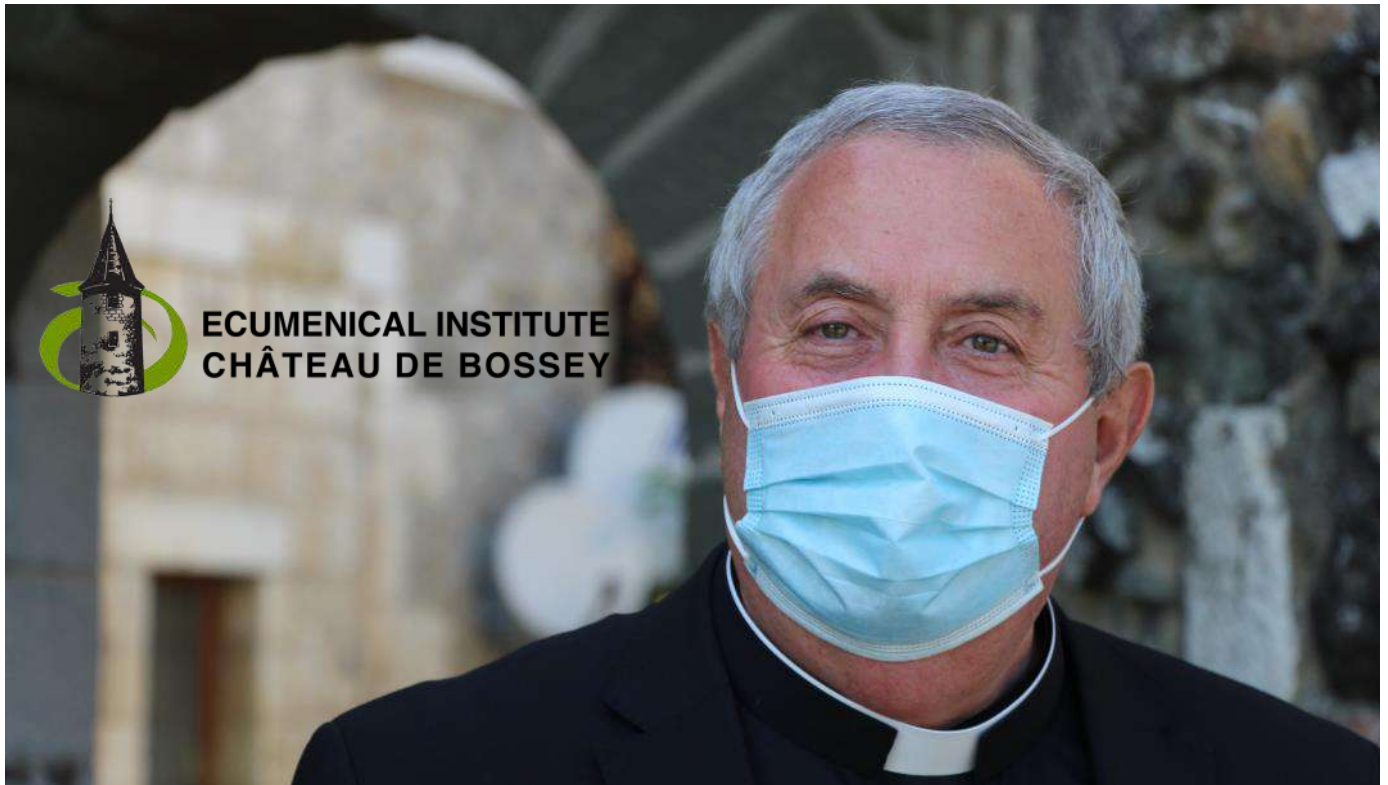
L'institut rappelle aux Églises de manière vivante et avec insistance qu'elles ont pour mission de motiver et former des jeunes gens afin qu'ils puissent s'engager en faveur de l'unité visible de l'Église et d'un monde plus juste et plus pacifique, que ce soit sur leur lieu d'activité ou dans le cadre du mouvement œcuménique. Avec ce centre, le COE veut mettre à disposition un lieu d'apprentissage et d'expérience œcuménique. Pour les Églises du COE, Bossey représente donc une référence très importante en tant que lieu d'études et de rencontres. La newsletter annexée de l'Institut œcuménique de Bossey de septembre 2021 donne des informations sur l'utilisation des ressources financières.

Un lien fort unit les Églises réformées de Suisse et l'Institut œcuménique de Bossey depuis des dizaines d'années. Des Églises et des paroisses à titre individuel entretiennent des relations nombreuses et diversifiées avec cet institut. Depuis des années, des paroisses de Suisse accueillent des étudiants de l'institut pendant l'Avent. L'EERS est représentée au sein du *Bossey Accompaniment Group* et par ailleurs s'engage en faveur des intérêts de l'institut.

Suivent d'autres possibilités d'action de nos Églises en faveur de l'Institut de Bossey :

- le soutien financier des Églises membres à des étudiantes et des étudiants suisses en théologie,
- l'encouragement des pasteurs et des pasteuses à suivre des cours à l'Institut dans le cadre de leur formation initiale et continue,
- l'organisation de conférences et de retraites à Bossey,
- une tâche permanente est d'inciter davantage de personnes effectuant leurs études en Suisse à suivre leur formation à l'Institut œcuménique,
- le lancement de collectes supplémentaires en faveur de Bossey. En 2021, les dons et collectes de l'EPER, des Églises cantonales, des paroisses et de personnes privées ont atteint la somme de CHF 213 643.00. La somme totale récoltée par le biais de l'EERS en 2021 s'est élevée à CHF 56 192.00. Les dons récoltés en Suisse représentent 23 % des revenus de Bossey, 37 % proviennent d'Églises à l'étranger, 40 % sont générés par l'Institut.

Le Conseil propose au Synode d'organiser une collecte au sein des Églises membres dans le but d'atteindre le montant visé de CHF 60 000 pour l'année 2023, et de répartir les montants collectés à parts égales entre l'Institut œcuménique et son Fonds des bourses.



Greetings from the Bossey Ecumenical Institute. I continue to thank God for your faithful prayers and generous support. It is because of you and others that Bossey continues its mission of forming ecumenically trained leaders to engage in the transformation of the church.

Your generosity enabled our resiliency. Despite the uncertainty of 2020 and early 2021, we graduated 24 students with certificates in ecumenical studies from 19 countries, representing 19 churches. Another four master's students from four countries, representing four churches, graduated in June, 2021. Even COVID-19 could not stop the ecumenical formation of pastors and theologians from around the world!

With great excitement, we are expected to welcome nearly 40 students for the 2021-2022 academic year, representing 32 churches from China, Democratic Republic of Congo, Egypt, Germany, Greece, Honduras, Hungary, Indonesia, Madagascar, Mexico, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Republic of Congo, Romania, Russia, South Korea, Sweden, Thailand, United Kingdom, United States of America, Ukraine and Zimbabwe.

While some schools focus on distilling and passing on information, the mission and pedagogy of Bossey is fundamentally formational. Our graduates should understand, embrace and insist that the church isn't simply called to preach the gospel with words or to enact it with service; it is also called to embody the gospel in the character of its own fellowship. We engage students in constructive, if sometimes difficult, dialogues at Bossey out

of a conviction that they need one another in order to be the church more fully and to understand God more truly.

The majority of students receive a scholarship to study at Bossey. The cost of a 6-month certificate course is about CHF 12,850. The cost for the master's programme is about CHF 24,500.

In 2020, the Ecumenical Institute received CHF 570,000 in scholarship funds from friends, parishes, churches, and partners. Through your generosity, we awarded CHF 450,000 in scholarships.

Your contribution helps make it possible for Bossey to continue reaching more students every year, forming leaders, transforming lives and helping the church make its unity in Christ visible to the world. On behalf of the students and faculty, please accept our sincere appreciation for your continued support.

Bossey graduates set out to “be ambassadors of reconciliation and unity”

Bossey combines academic teaching and experiential learning, as the students live together, share everyday life, participate in prayer and go on study visits together. The curriculum connects theory and practice in order to enable formation that may lead to transformation.

As they return to their home countries, graduates fondly recall their formation and look forward to using it to transform their communities



Zhao Meiqing, from China, defined the 2020-21 graduating class as “the COVID generation,” citing a year full of uncertainties, constant changes and adaptations.

“Thanks to the tireless efforts of the faculty at Bossey, not only are we a group of no less diversity, we have also made the best of the time, living out ecumenism together! Bossey, as the ecumenical laboratory, is a place where chemistry happens through our encountering, sharing and learning together. Walls that separate us are broken down as we appreciate the diversity among us with understanding and patience.”

Graduation is not the destination of their journey together, Meiqing added. “As we head back to where we are from, we joyfully bring with us the burden of embodying the spirit of unity gifted to us and carrying the movement forward through the love of Christ, to be ambassadors of reconciliation and unity in our respective contexts!”

Rev. Evans Nyamadzawo, from Zimbabwe, described Bossey as “a full package of ecumenism” in all aspects. “Unity in diversity is expressed in all forms: in classes, prayer life, and daily life. It was amazing how we interacted in and outside the classes despite our differences in race, regions, countries, languages, and churches.”

Nyamadzawo’s vision is to be an ambassador of ecumenism in Zimbabwe and beyond. “I would like to promote ecumenism in all circles I am part of.”



“Living with and experiencing people with different ideas and cultures was most rewarding for me at Bossey,” said **Rev. Sang Hoon Han**, a missionary from Burundi. “I realized that there were people with different perspectives beyond my imagination, and I wish to become a more humble and inclusive person.”

Han is heading home to teach Burundi churches and Christians about the ecumenical movement and spirit.

“Moreover, I want to help them to be more tolerant and inclusive of their conversations with people of other faiths.”

2020 exchange of Bossey students with Swiss Protestant parishes

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, study visits to Swiss Protestant parishes were not allowed in 2020. Instead, an online exchange with representatives of the Reformed Church Bern-Jura-Solothurn took place with Rev. Susanne Schneeberger, Rev. Heinz Bichsel and Ms Lisa Krebs, all belonging to the organizing partner OeME Secretariat of cantons Bern-Jura-Solothurn of the Reformed Protestant Church in Switzerland.

The meeting was well-organized in three sessions: 1) Overall religious landscape in Switzerland and especially the Reformed Church; 2) Local thematic work on interreligious dialogue; and, 3) Local thematic work on “blue community” and other ecological concerns.

Students participated in all sessions and gave the meeting very positive responses, noting how the sessions informed their understandings and modelled how to critically and constructively reflect on the challenges and opportunities in a particular context while engaging across contexts with urgent global challenges.



Kirsty Borthwick, from the UK, reflected on the exchange:

“Since I am engaged in parish placements at home in the UK as part of my ordination training, I was excited about the prospect of spending a weekend with a Swiss Parish.

Whilst disappointed that the in-person visit had to be cancelled, I am very grateful for the ingenuity and flexibility of our hosts in putting together an online programme in its place.

It was excellent to learn about the Swiss Reformed tradition and in particular about specific projects the Swiss Reformed Church is engaged in.

It was good to relate what we have learned about water justice and interreligious work in the programmes of the WCC to what is happening in similar projects in the Swiss local context.

I was grateful that our hosts were so open to conversation and questions.”
